# Draw to Learn The Book of Psalms How to Use the Curriculum

The **Draw to Learn Series** helps children internalize truths from God's Word. It is a learning method designed to help children who love art learn the Bible in a way that is enjoyable for them. It also shows children who are not as interested in art how enjoyable it can be. The **Draw to Learn Series** teaches skills that will make children more successful artists.

The study is designed to encourage children to think and to see as an artist thinks and sees. These skills are steps toward making art an enjoyable hobby. Each lesson has three vital steps:

#### Read • Think • Draw

- First, read the Bible passage and think about what it means.
- Second, read the instructions at the bottom of the page and think about what you will draw.
- Third, draw your picture in the frame provided on each page, remembering to fill up the whole frame with your picture.

#### What Ages Can Use This Curriculum?

A Child Using the Curriculum Independently. Children who can read the Bible for themselves can use this curriculum. It has no upper age limit because a child of any age can complete the course at his or her own skill level. The parent needs to supply:

- This curriculum.
- A pencil (2B drawing pencil preferred).
- Good quality colored pencils made for artists. (We recommend the Prismacolor<sup>®</sup> brand. See "Suggestions for Drawing the Pictures" on page 3.)
- Reference materials (see "Suggestions for Drawing the Pictures" on page 3).

A Family Studying the Curriculum Together. All ages can use this curriculum. A child who is not yet reading can listen to the passage. This study is ideal for home educating families because everyone can participate. To get the most from the study, older children should be given plenty of time to read, think, and draw. Young children will probably finish much faster than their siblings.

#### Why Are There 150 Lessons?

The 150 lessons are designed to cover an entire school year. Since many homeschooling families study for 180 days, this curriculum gives a child time to go on field trips and do other activities without getting behind. A child can also take two days to complete a picture when he or she is putting in great detail.

#### Suggestions for Drawing the Pictures

Your family will experience success with the pictures if you follow these instructions:

- Work diligently. Spend plenty of time on your drawings. Put in details. Show the surroundings. Each lesson should take at least 45 minutes to complete, and some should take longer.
- **Use color.** Sometimes you may want to do detailed pencil drawings, but be sure to do many of them in color. You may use crayons or colored pencils, but we recommend buying a good set of colored pencils made for artists. We recommend the Prismacolor<sup>®</sup> Thick Lead brand by Sanford. We highly recommend any Prismacolor<sup>®</sup> art supplies. Their colored pencils blend beautifully. Their colored pencil sharpener is great, too.
- Use a model or a picture. When you are making a drawing, it is important to know
  what your objects, people, and scenery really look like. Of course, drawing from your
  imagination is sometimes fun; but usually you will get better results if you have
  something to go by. Use encyclopedias, magazines, other reference materials, and
  family photo albums to find photographs of the people, places, and objects you want
  to draw. Also, you can use live models and objects in your home or in God's
  creation.
- **Draw people.** Some people feel uncertain about drawing people. Don't worry about it. Your people can be realistic or they can be a cartoon style and you don't have to use the same style every time! I've even seen some pretty expressive stick people!
- **Fill up the frame.** Be sure to fill up the whole frame with your drawing.
- Protect your drawing surface. It is always a good idea to put a sheet of heavy
  paper behind your paper when you are drawing. This protects your drawing surface.
  In a sketch book or in your Draw to Learn The Book of Psalms, the heavy paper
  protects the rest of your sheets. It keeps them from getting indentions from the
  pressure of your pencil.
- Sketch first. When you begin a drawing, sketch on a separate piece of paper first before you draw in your book. When you begin a drawing in your book, draw lightly at first so you can erase any mistakes. When you have your drawing the way you want it, you can darken your lines. In fact, you should. Two of my art teacher's favorite words were, "Darken up!" Once you have your drawing the way you want it, be confident and "darken up!"

- Prepare for tomorrow. Before you finish each day, look at the sheet for the next day. You may need to gather props and pictures or look outside at a particular time of day.
- Have fun. Always keep a sense of wonder at God's amazing power, His work in our lives, and what He has done in Creation.


#### Expanding this Study of Psalms into a Unit Study

Some families might enjoy expanding this study into a unit study. If so, here are a few ideas.

- Further Bible Study. When you look up the passage for each day, use a Bible with cross-references to read other passages in the Bible that teach about the topic.
- **Handwriting.** The child can copy verses from each day's lesson for handwriting practice and to hide the Word in his heart.
- Art. Many passages give inspiration for other drawings besides the ones described in the curriculum.
- **Science.** Many passages mention the elements from God's Creation. Research some of these wonders and write about them. For example, when you make a drawing about crops, read a book about farming.
- **History and Geography.** When the passage mentions a scale, find out about weights and measures in Bible times and today.
- **Creative Writing.** Have children write sentences, paragraphs, stories, or research papers on some of the ideas inspired by the passages or by the related books.
- **Make a Notebook.** Give your child a notebook in which to store all the related handwriting and art papers and a list of books read.
- Use your imagination and the library!








Read Psalm 2. Think of a place of refuge. People and animals find refuge in many places. Prairie dogs find refuge underground. A nest is a refuge for baby birds. During a rainstorm, people find refuge in their homes. During war, refugees find refuge in refugee camps. Draw a place of refuge.






Read Psalm 3. For many centuries soldiers used shields to protect themselves from enemy weapons. Armies have used various shapes and materials. Design a shield. Draw your shield so that people can tell what material was used. Design your shield so people will know Who your Commander is.




Read Psalm 4. Look at your bed. What material was used to make it? How far is it off the floor? What are the colors and designs on your bed linens? Do you keep any pillows or stuffed animals on it? Draw a picture of your bed.





Read Psalm 5. Look outside your home early in the morning. Look in several directions. What is the weather like today? Is there dew or fog? Is there sunshine? Where is the sun? What differences of color can you see when you look to the east and then to the west? Choose a morning scene that you would like to draw today and draw a picture of the morning outside your home.






Read Psalm 6. Think about how a person looks when he is crying. What color are her eyes and her nose? What is the shape of his mouth? Draw a person crying. Remember that the LORD hears our cries now and He has promised us that there will be no tears in heaven.






Read Psalm 7. Jesus died to save us from our guilt. Because we love Him, we want to serve Him with our hands and keep our hands from evil. Take your pencil in the hand you use when you are drawing. Lay your other hand on the table at some interesting angle. Try several poses. Examine your hand carefully. See the various shapes, angles, and wrinkles. Draw your hand.

The Lord has made people rule over the works of His Hands.




Read Psalm 8. Choose a specific person to draw. Think about this person. What is unique about him or her? What can you put in your drawing so that people can tell who you were thinking about? Think about how that person praises God and about the fact that God has made him or her a ruler over what He has made! Draw the person.







Read Psalm 9. Look at a map of the world or at a globe. Choose one of the continents and draw it. Draw all the nations on that continent.






Read Psalm 10. The LORD is actively watching out for people who are hurting. Notice these verbs in Psalm 10: **see**, **consider**, **encourage**, **and listen**. Make a poster using these four verbs. It can remind you to do what God does. Have you noticed that books and advertisements use many different types of lettering to communicate? Use a different style of lettering for each word. To letter neatly, use a ruler to draw two faint parallel lines for each word. Make the top of your letters touch the top line and the bottom of your letters touch the bottom line. Try to make your poster exciting by using bright colors and by placing the words in interesting places on the poster.






Read Psalm 11. Someday the righteous will see the LORD's face! Sight is such a blessing. Look in a mirror and draw your eyes. Keep looking in the mirror from time to time as you draw. Copy the color of your iris. Notice the direction of your eyelashes. Look for the shiny spot on your iris. Remember to leave a white spot for that gleam. Notice the dark pupil and draw that in the center of your iris.






Read Psalm 12. Look at several people or pictures of people. Can you find different types of lips? Draw some. Can you show how these people are feeling by the way you draw their lips?






Read Psalm 13. Think about a joyful face. Is the face young or old? Does it have the same skin color as yours? Is this a person you know or did you find a face in a book or in your imagination? How can you tell that the face is joyful? If you covered the mouth, could you still see the joy in the eyes? Draw a joyful face.




Read Psalm 14. Talk with your parents about something you can do for the poor. Decide together that you will give something to a poor person or family. Draw what you plan to give.









Read Psalm 20. Think of your dreams for the future. Some dreams are for tomorrow or next week. Other dreams are for many years from now. Draw a picture of your dream.




Read Psalm 21. Design a crown. You could make an interesting shape for the crown's edge and "engrave" it with beautiful and intricate designs.






Read Psalm 24. Fill the frame with faces. Make each one different. Make some old and some young. Use a variety of skin colors. Put hats from other cultures on some of them.







Read Psalm 25. Begin at the top left corner of the frame and draw a small picture showing yourself getting up in the morning. Make rows of pictures showing what you do each day in chronological order. End at the bottom right corner with a picture of you going to bed.






Read Psalm 26. The psalmist knows that he can follow the LORD better if he does not spend his time with evil people. Evil people tempt us to do evil also. Righteous people help us to follow the LORD. Think of the righteous people in your life who help you to follow the LORD better. Draw one or more of them in the frame above. Think about the person's hair, skin, eyes, and smile. Try to make your picture look like him or her. Perhaps you could draw an object you often see in his or her hand or the room where you most often see him. This will help others recognize the person you have drawn.






Read Psalm 27. Think about something that usually makes you afraid. At the top of the frame write, "The LORD will protect me from \_\_\_\_\_\_," filling in the blank with your fear. Draw a picture illustrating your fear. As you draw, think about ways the LORD protects you from that fear.






Read Psalm 28. In the center of the frame, write the words to one of your favorite songs of thanksgiving. Illustrate the song around the edge of the frame.







Read Psalm 30. Think about a time when you have asked the LORD to heal you. Draw a part of your body that the LORD has healed.






Read Psalm 34. This psalm compares finding out about the LORD's goodness to our sense of taste. Draw a food that you love to taste.




Read Psalm 36. Draw an underwater ocean scene. Fill it with many sea creatures God created to live there.





Read Psalm 37. Draw a heart. Illustrate one of God's laws inside it.






Read Psalm 40. Think of a wonder the LORD has done and draw it here.




The Israelite fathers told their children what God had done for them in their day.



Read Psalm 44. Draw a picture of a father teaching his child about the LORD's amazing deeds.






Read Psalm 46. Draw a picture of yourself being still.




Read Psalm 47. Draw the earth. Remembering that God is King of all nations, think about which side of the earth you would like to draw.



Read Psalm 48. Find some artwork depicting scenes from Jerusalem during the time of David. Draw a beautiful part of Jerusalem from that time.






Every animal of the forest belongs to God.

Read Psalm 50. Draw many different kinds of forest animals.





Read Psalm 52. Find a picture of an olive tree or a picture of the Garden of Gethsemane. Draw an olive tree or an olive grove.




Read Psalm 53. Draw a picture of a person studying the Word of God.






Read Psalm 54. Write a prayer asking for God's help. Design a border around the prayer that illustrates the words.




Read Psalm 55. Draw two lines across the frame to divide it into three parts. Draw the same scene in the evening, morning, and at noon.






Read Psalm 56. Write I Peter 1:24-25 in the center of the frame and then draw grasses and flowers around the edge.






Read Psalm 57. Draw a starry night, showing a constellation. Use layers of both blue and black to color your sky.




Read Psalm 58. Find a picture or description of a cobra and draw one here.






Read Psalm 59. People have built many fortresses throughout history. In Europe people built castles and in the United States they built forts. Draw a fortress.








Read Psalm 62. From the very beginning of time, God has provided rest for people. Draw a picture of yourself resting.






Read Psalm 64. Close your eyes and think about what God has done. Illustrate something you have thought about.






Read Psalm 68. Choose a type of weather and then draw the clouds that produce that kind of weather.











Read Psalm 75. Draw a person who lives in the desert. Draw their home and the surrounding scene. Perhaps you would like to draw a Bedouin.


God is more majestic than mountains filled with animals which people can hunt.






Read Psalm 77. Think about one of God's miracles in the Old or New Testaments. Illustrate one of them.




Read Psalm 78. Draw a picture of a mother teaching her child about the LORD.



Read Psalm 79. Imagine a time in the future when you will tell the next generation about the LORD. Draw a picture illustrating what you would like them to know.




Read Psalm 80. Draw a beautiful grape vine with many grapes hanging from it. Think about the fact that Christians are branches on Jesus, the Vine.





God commanded the Israelites to sound the ram's horn at the new moon and when the moon was full.

Read Psalm 81. Draw a picture of the sky with a full moon. (See Numbers 10:10.)




Read Psalm 82. Think of people who are weak. Draw a picture illustrating these people. How old are these people? Where do they live? Why are they weak? Show this in your picture.








Read Psalm 86. Illustrate a way His love abounds toward you.




Read Psalm 87. Choose another scene from Jerusalem and draw it here. (See the page for Psalm 48.)




Read Psalm 88. Draw a picture of sunlight coming in a window in the morning.






Read Psalm 90. Draw an object or event from more than a thousand years ago.






Read Psalm 92. Draw a fresh green fruit tree bearing beautiful fruit.



The One who created the ear hears what the people on the earth are saying.




Read Psalm 94. Draw an ear. Is it a baby's ear? Is the ear a man's or a woman's? How can you tell by looking at your picture?



Let all the wise consider the great love of the Lord as evidenced by this psalm.






Read Psalm 108. Draw yourself singing in the center of this frame. Fill the frame with other faces from all over the world. Draw them singing too.
