About This Resource

This gazetteer is part of the *Exploring World Geography* curriculum published by Notgrass History. When a lesson in the curriculum is about a particular country, the student will find it helpful to have the gazetteer open to that country's map while reading the lesson. Use the table of contents or the index to find the correct page number.

In the Assignments box following most of the lessons in the curriculum, the student is instructed to study the maps and read the information for certain countries. The assignment gives the page numbers that the student should read. In this way the student will learn about every region of the world and every country in the world.

We have included population figures for each country, including the relative percentages of young people (under 25) and older people (over 65). We have also described the government with a short phrase that does not capture all of the differences in political organization from country to country.

For major religions, we have listed organized groups that have members equaling about 5% or more of the local population. The number of active


participants is often significantly lower than the number of members or adherents claimed by a certain group. Some countries have official state religions, which may or may not reflect the sentiments of the population.

The last section of the gazetteer is a collection of primary source documents and photo essays related to geography, literature, and worldview. One lesson in each unit in the curriculum assigns a selection for the student to read after finishing that lesson. The *Student Review Book* includes questions on many (but not all) of the documents, following the review questions for that lesson. The parent can assign these questions if he or she wishes to do so. Answers for these questions are in the *Guide for Parents and Answer Key*.

We hope that this gazetteer will be a resource that your family will find useful for years to come.











Excerpts from *Geography*

Strabo (c. 20 AD)

Strabo was born in 64 BC in northeastern Asia Minor. He was well educated and widely traveled. Near the end of his life he compiled information from his travels and the notes of others into a seventeen-volume work entitled Geography. The following are excerpts from the beginning of that work.



15th-Century Illustration of Strabo

If the scientific investigation of any subject be the proper avocation of the philosopher, Geography, the science of which we propose to treat, is certainly entitled to a high place; and this is evident from many considerations. They who first ventured to handle the matter were distinguished men, Homer, Anaximander the Milesian, and Hecatæus, (his fellow-citizen according to Eratosthenes), Democritus, Eudoxus, Dicæarchus, Ephorus, with many others, and after these Eratosthenes, Polybius, and Posidonius, all of them philosophers.

Nor is the great learning, through which alone this subject can be approached, possessed by any but a person acquainted with both human and divine things and these attainments constitute what is called philosophy. In addition to its vast importance in regard to social life, and the art of government, Geography unfolds to us the celestial phenomena, acquaints us with the occupants of the land and ocean, and the vegetation, fruits, and peculiarities of the various quarters of the earth, a knowledge of which marks him who cultivates it as a man earnest in the great problem of life and happiness.

Admitting this, let us examine more in detail the points we have advanced.

And first, that both we and our predecessors, amongst whom is Hipparchus, do justly regard Homer as the founder of geographical science, for he not only excelled all, ancient as well as modern, in the sublimity of his poetry, but also in his experience of social life. Thus it was that he not only exerted himself to become familiar with as many historic facts as possible, and transmit them to posterity, but also with the various regions of the inhabited land and sea, some intimately, others in a more general manner. For otherwise he would not have reached the utmost limits of the earth, traversing it in his imagination.

First, he stated that the earth was entirely encompassed by the ocean, as in truth it is; afterwards he described the countries, specifying some by name, others more generally by various indications, explicitly defining Libya, Ethiopia, the Sidonians, and the Erembi (by which latter are probably intended the Troglodyte Arabians); and alluding to those farther east and west as the lands washed by the ocean, for in ocean he believed both the sun and constellations to rise and set. . . .

By the Bear, then, which [Homer] elsewhere calls the Wain, and describes as pursuing Orion, Homer means us to understand the Arctic Circle; and by the ocean, that horizon into which, and out of which, the stars rise and set. When he says that the Bear turns round and is deprived of the ocean, he was aware that the

Arctic Circle [always] extended to the sign opposite the most northern point of the horizon. Adapting the words of the poet to this view, by that part of the earth nearest to the ocean we must understand the horizon, and by the Arctic Circle that which extends to the signs which seem to our senses to touch in succession the most northern point of the horizon. Thus, according to him, this portion of the earth is washed by the ocean. With the nations of the North he was well acquainted, although he does not mention them by name, and indeed at the present day there is no regular title by which they are all distinguished. . . .

The [motions] of the sun and stars, and the centripetal force meet us on the very threshold of such subjects, and compel us to the study of astronomy, and the observation of such phenomena as each of us may notice; in which too, very considerable differences appear, according to the various points of observation. How could any one undertake to write accurately and with propriety on the differences of the various parts of the earth, who was ignorant of these matters? and although, if the undertaking were of a popular character, it might not be advisable to enter thoroughly into detail, still we should endeavour to include every thing which could be comprehended by the general reader.

He who has thus elevated his mind, will he be satisfied with anything less than the whole world? If in his anxiety accurately to portray the inhabited earth, he has dared to survey heaven, and make use thereof for purposes of instruction, would it not seem childish were he to refrain from examining the whole earth, of which the inhabited is but a part, its size, its features, and its position in the universe; whether other portions are inhabited besides those on which we dwell, and if so, their amount? What is the extent of the regions not peopled? what their peculiarities, and the cause of their remaining as they are? Thus it appears that the knowledge of geography is connected with meteorology and geometry, that it unites the things of earth to the things of heaven, as though they were nearly allied, and not separated.




Title Page from a 17th-Century Latin Edition of Strabo's Work

Historic Maps from Around the World

Different people groups have created maps to meet their own internal needs, to communicate information to other people groups, and to identify their place in the world.

A 13th-century monk created a map of the Roman world. Known as the Tabula Peutingeriana, the complete scroll is just over one foot tall and twenty-two feet long. It shows cities and roads from England to India. Details on the scroll suggest that it is based on multiple older maps going back to the first century AD. The original is faded and worn. Here is a small section showing Rome from a 19th-century reproduction of the map. Because of the elongated perspective of the map, this section also shows parts of Southeastern Europe at the top and parts of North Africa at the bottom.



The Chinese were producing high quality maps before the time of Christ. Their creation of a portable compass enabled them to engage in long-range travel by ship and to create even more accurate maps during the Medieval period. This map showing China is from a 16th-century Atlas of the Ming Empire. For some unknown reason, the island of Taiwan is not depicted.




The Codex Quetzalecatzin dates from the late 1500s. It highlights the conflict and collaboration between the native Nahuatl (or Aztec) people and the Spanish colonists. The map includes the genealogy of a Nahuatl family who trace their lineage back to local leader Lord-11 Quetzalecatzin in 1480. Like other indigenous maps from this time period, it seems to be an attempt by local families to demonstrate their claims to land. Nahuatl symbols and writing on the map contrast with Spanish names and two churches that provide geographic reference points in Mexico.



Members of a native nation, likely the Catawba people, created a map on deerskin and presented it to the colonial governor of South Carolina around 1721. Though the original has been lost, the British made two copies of the map. The map depicts the British settlements on the coast of South Carolina on the left. The circles represent native communities spread across the Carolinas. Instead of being a precise geographic map, this map emphasizes the communication and trade networks between the British and the various native nations.



Rebbelib (also called stick charts) were used by people in the Marshall Islands. Shells represent islands. The coconut fibers or bamboo sticks connecting the shells indicate ocean currents and ocean swells, caused by wind patterns. Because of their fragility, these maps would most likely not have been carried on a journey. The navigator would have to memorize the information before departure.



Captivating Cappadocia

Cappadocia is an historic region located on the rugged plateau of Central Turkey north of the Taurus Mountains. Lake Tuz to the west is a hypersaline body of water (like the Dead Sea).

Volcanic activity in the past spread ash around the area. The compacted ash solidified into tuff, a soft rock. Erosion has left rock columns called hoodoos up to 130 feet high (see below). These unusual formations are also known as rock spires or fairy chimneys. Natural caves and other geologic features fill the landscape.

People have lived in the caves of Cappadocia since the time of the Hittites centuries before Christ. Over the centuries, the area has been a battleground as various empires swept through. In such times, residents often hid in the caves.



Cappadocia had a role in the life of the early church. Residents of Cappadocia (no doubt Jews) were present on the Day of Pentecost when the Holy Spirit came upon the disciples gathered in Jerusalem (Acts 2:9). Peter addressed his first letter to believers scattered throughout Cappadocia and nearby areas (1 Peter 1:1). During the time of Roman persecution in the early centuries of the church, Christians lived, gathered, and hid in Cappadocia.

People have carved dwellings, places of worship, and public buildings out of the tuff. El Nazar Church was carved into a hoodoo in the 10th century. See frescoes from it at right.

Some of these manmade complexes have eight stories underground. The underground city of Derinkuyu could house up to 20,000 people. Get a glimpse of Derinkuyu below.



Today Cappadocia is a popular tourist site. Some modern hotels are built into the tuff and utilize existing caves. Balloon rides over the landscape are a popular activity.




The Gods of the Copybook Headings

Rudyard Kipling (1919)

Rudyard Kipling (1865-1936) was a British novelist, poet, short story writer, and journalist. British schoolchildren used copybooks to practice their handwriting. At the top of a page was usually a popular saying or a statement of conventional wisdom, such as “A stitch in time saves nine” or “Haste makes waste.” As the student worked on his handwriting he imbibed the lessons of these sayings.

The tendency in each new generation is to want to push aside the old way of thinking and adopt a new “enlightened” worldview. In this poem Kipling satirizes the appeal of fads and promises of modern ideologies that appear from time to time, and how they always disappoint. We might try to reject the tried and true wisdom of the ages, but in the end it alone will stand. His point is that we shouldn’t be swayed by popular ideas but instead should live by the truths that have stood for ages and will still be standing at the end of time.

Although Kipling was the grandson of Methodist ministers on both sides, his life did not demonstrate personal devotion to Christ. This poem has allusions to evolutionary theory, but it also has several references to passages from the Bible. Even though Kipling himself drifted away from traditional faith, he could not completely escape the influence of Biblical values and teaching.



As I pass through my incarnations in every age and race,
I make my proper prostrations to the gods of the Market Place.
Peering through reverent fingers I watch them flourish and fall,
And the gods of the copybook headings, I notice, outlast them all.

We were living in trees when they met us. They showed us each in turn
That Water would certainly wet us, as Fire would certainly burn:
But we found them lacking in Uplift, Vision and Breadth of Mind,
So we left them to teach the Gorillas while we followed the March of Mankind.

We moved as the spirit listed. They never altered their pace,
Being neither cloud nor wind-borne like the gods of the Market Place,
But they always caught up with our progress, and presently word would come
That a tribe had been wiped off its icefield, or the lights had gone out in Rome.

With the Hopes that our World is built on they were utterly out of touch,
They denied that the Moon was Stilton; they denied she was even Dutch;

They denied that Wishes were Horses; they denied that a Pig had Wings;
So we worshipped the gods of the Market who promised these beautiful things.

When the Cambrian measures were forming, They promised perpetual peace.
They swore, if we gave them our weapons, that the wars of the tribes would cease.
But when we disarmed They sold us and delivered us bound to our foe,
And the gods of the copybook headings said: "Stick to the devil you know."

On the first Feminian Sandstones we were promised the Fuller Life
(Which started by loving our neighbour and ended by loving his wife)
Till our women had no more children and the men lost reason and faith,
And the gods of the copybook headings said: "The wages of sin is death."

In the Carboniferous Epoch we were promised abundance for all,
By robbing selected Peter to pay for collective Paul;
But, though we had plenty of money, there was nothing our money could buy,
And the gods of the copybook headings said: "If you don't work you die."

Then the Gods of the Market tumbled, and their smooth-tongued wizards withdrew
And the hearts of the meanest were humbled and began to believe it was true
That all is not gold that glitters, and two and two make four
And the gods of the copybook headings limped up to explain it once more.

As it will be in the future, it was at the birth of Man
There are only four things certain since Social Progress began.
That the dog returns to his vomit and the sow returns to her mire,
And the burnt fool's bandaged finger goes wabbling back to the fire;

And that after this is accomplished, and the brave new world begins
When all men are paid for existing and no man must pay for his sins,
As surely as water will wet us, as surely as fire will burn,
The gods of the copybook headings with terror and slaughter return!

The Sahara

The Sahara is the largest hot desert in the world. (Much of Antarctica is considered a desert, too, since precipitation there is so low, but that is obviously a cold desert!)

The Sahara is larger than the lower 48 United States. It takes up nearly one third of the land area of Africa.

The landscape of the Sahara is a bit more complicated than sand. Regs are sand and gravel plains that cover about 70 percent of the Sahara. See the example below from Morocco.
